## Scoring:

This year we have implemented hole-by-hole scoring into the online system. What we mean by "scoring" is we enter actual strokes taken. The system then calculates the CORRECT MATCH points per hole based on those strokes taken. This alleviates common errors as found on the cards (many times where strokes were not given or taken properly and added incorrectly.) When people are attesting the cards, they are attesting to the strokes taken.

Captains should e-mail the handicapper, Pete Michno, no later than 1100 Thursday to give their line-ups. However, I'm sure the handicapper would appreciate Captains providing the line-ups earlier if you have them set. 1100 on Thursday should be the exception, not the rule.

Captains should inform all retirees and non-NUWC members on their teams to use the website for all League information.

## Slow Play Watch:

Guys it is starting to show and look like slow play so keep the pace of play up. If you are ready hit don't wait for everyone else while they talk and slow down. MOVE Faster People and don't doddle around the course. The first group usually finishes up near a 2 hour and 15 minute pace. The most the last group should be is a 2 hour and 40 minute pace. Keep moving and be aware of your spacing. Each group should have a ranger to keep the group moving along. Dedicate a person in your tee group to push everyone.
